









TRACES OF THE GREAT WAR COMIC WORKSHOP ACTIVITIES











Inspired by Traces of The Great War Anthology

The creative use of art materials will support learning and develop visual critical analysis in the classroom. Inspired by the visual aesthetic of Baudoin's comic panels, pupils explore a creative process to engage with topical images. Through visual learning pupils develop their critical analysis to help form educated opinions on topics or issues they are studying. This activity is technique driven, using artistic materials in any classroom setting and skills are transferable to the curriculum. Each creative process is demonstrated in a video tutorial.

1. Read the comic *Really?* Written and illustrated by Edmond Baudoin (p116 – 122)

Please note some images contain illustrations of conflict and nudity. This comic can be read, and edited, with the educators' discretion. This series of activities is still possible when only a selection of the panels are used.

- 2. Possible questions for teacher led pupil discussion:
 - What were the two young children talking about?
 - If there was a moral to this story what might it be?
 - Describe the different art materials and artistic techniques you think the illustrator may have used to draw this comic.
 - Discuss the differences between the two drawing styles used by the illustrator. How do they help the reader understand what is happening in the story?
 - Take a closer look at one of the panels, really look in detail and describe what you can see. What do you notice now that you didn't see at first glance?
 - Think about how this story is told. Explain how the storytelling is weighted between the text and image (words and pictures).
- Complete a comic book review of Really? using the LitWit and VisWiz Comic Review sheet.
- 4. The first Skills Share video tutorial demonstrates a printing technique by copying an existing image, allowing pupils to take a closer look and visually engage with the content of a picture (without the added pressure of drawing freehand). The comics mechanism of adding a second smaller panel within the image they create allows pupils to add a comment

showing what they have learnt through their visual study.

However, these techniques and style of illustration can also be applied to visually investigate other subject material across the curriculum.

Next, choose three different sections of the story to draw in a 3 picture review.


You could draw 3 very important parts of the story, or your 3 favourite bits, or create a synopsis by drawing something from the start, middle and end of the story.
